CONSERVATION FARMER AWARD - 1989

The 1989 Conservation Farmer of the Year award went to Kay and Marion Satterlie of rural Evansville. They were chosen from a select group of outstanding conservation minded farmers by the Board of Supervisors of the Douglas SWCD because of their participation and interest for installing conservation practices on their farm that will insure continued productivity of the soil and water resources for the future.

Conservation practices incorporated into the Satterlies farming operation includes terraces and sediment control structures, no-till and reduced tillage, feed lot control system to prevent run-off for protection of surface and ground water from pollution. Also wildlife ponds, no-till test plots and a shelterbelt are a part of their conservation practices.

Kay and Marion also provided a no-till demonstration plot for several years which was viewed by hundreds of people from several counties. Presently the University of Minnesota has a demonstration plot on their farm which compares the differences of no-till, minimum till and conventional till practices.

The Satterlies were guests of the Douglas SWCD at the State Convention of the Minnesota Soil and Water Conservation Districts held in December at the Kahler Hotel, Rochester, MN. Kay and Marion were presented their award by "The Farmer" magazine along with other conservation award winners throughout the state. Congratulations to the Satterlies, America can be proud of you!
