CONSERVATION FARMER OF THE YEAR AWARD FOR 1991 By Craig Haseman, Member, Board of Supervisors

The 1991 Conservation Cooperator of the Year Award for Douglas County went to Carlton and Twyla Johnson of rural Evansville, MN. This award is presented each year to recognize outstanding participation and leadership in implementing conservation practices which ensure the preservation and productivity of our land within the Douglas County Soil and Water Conservation District.

The Johnson's reside south of Evansville on an 800 acre beef farm. Conservation practices incorporated into their farming operation include: 4,400 feet of terracing, four sediment retention structures, 3.3 acres of trees and berry producing shrubs for wildlife cover, 1.6 acres of trees planted for farmstead shelterbelts, and food plots for the wildlife to help in their survival through our long winters.

Carlton notes that "stewardship of the land" is his reason for being a conservation farmer. Carlton was a founding member of the Douglas SWCD which began in 1957 and presently includes 20 townships. The Johnson's have shown a long term commitment to the stewardship which benefits all of us.

The Johnson's were presented their award by "The Farmer" magazine at the Minnesota Association of Soil and Water Conservation District's Annual Convention in Duluth, MN, along with other conservation award winners throughout the state. Twyla and their grandson, Darrin Quinn, who is quite interested in farming and actively involved in the Johnson operation, attended the awards banquet.
